All pupils agreed that the week was worthwhile and people got to experience new things they wouldn't normally be exposed to during timetabled classes. Earlston's Exodus

Excursions week this year involved nearly all S2 and S3 Pupils. S2 pupils went on excursions to York, Liverpool and the Ardeche in France. S3 pupils travelled to Krakow in Poland or the Battlefields of WW1 in Belgium and France. Other pupils opted for some activities closer to home as part of the Border Explorers and City Sights trips. Some of our S3 pupils even got pampered at Borders College by students on the Hair and Beauty Therapy courses. In all, around 350 pupils and 40 staff went on these excursions which wouldn't have happened without the hard work of our office staff to put it all together in the background. Thank you to the staff who gave up their time to plan and run these trips to ensure our pupils had a great experience.

Krakow, Poland

Thirty- six pupils and 4 staff went on an excursion to Krakow, Poland from 19^{th} to 22^{nd} May. Pupils got to visit places such as the Underground Museum, Auschwitz and Birkenau Concentration Camps, Schindler's Factory, Wawel Castle and The Salt Mines. It was a particularly educational trip with some very sombre and reflective moments, including a talk from Holocaust survivor, Monika Goldwasser. The pupils also got to experience some fun elements such as a few hours in the large shopping mall. All agreed it was a wonderful trip and the behaviour of our pupils was exemplary.

Battlefields, Belgium and France

On the 19th of May, 118 S3 students departed Earlston for Belgium and France. The school annually makes this trip to see the World War I battle sites and museums in the surrounding the area. I was honoured to be asked to be one of three students (along with Ruaridh McIntyre and Harry McCrindle) selected to lay the wreath for the school at the Last Post Ceremony in Ypres. Although the service was short and the only thing I had to do was walk and lay down the wreath, it was nerve-racking. The atmosphere at Menin Gate wasn't like anything I'd experienced before. Even though there was a vast amount of people, including several school groups, it was practically silent. The service itself was so emotive – being surrounded by 54,000 names of missing soldiers while the Last Post was played is something I will never forget. Ardeche, France

One hundred and twenty S2 pupils left EHS on 17th May at 6am to depart for France. When there, they took part in activities such as kayaking and canoeing and a 2 day river decent of the Ardeche River, involving an overnight camp. They visited the Salt Caves and Haribo factory. Pupils took part in fun activities like high ropes, the 'leap of faith' and archery. Everyone had a wonderful time and returned tired but happy.

Liverpool

The school's first trip to Liverpool was enjoyed by 18 pupils. The itinerary included activities such as visits to the Albert Docks and Anfield football stadium. Pupils followed in the footsteps of The Beatles by visiting the Cavern Club. They also went to the cinema, bowling and on a river boat trip down the Mersey. We hope this will be a regular excursion as they all had a blast!









York

Thirty eight pupils and their teachers left for York on the morning of 20th May. They enjoyed visits to the Jorvik Viking Centre, York Minster, York Castle Museum, York Chocolate Factory and The National Railway Museum. They walked the city walls and even fitted in some shopping time on the famous Shambles. One of the highlights was a trip to Flamingo Land Theme park. The weather was very good for the whole trip and everyone had a great time!

City Sights—Pupil Support Report

Some of our pupil who work in Pupil Support were visiting various attractions around Scotland with other students in S2 and S3. Bronte in S4 told us about the Edinburgh day trip, "We went to Edinburgh on the bus. We visited the Castle and there is an amazing view of Edinburgh from there. It was very busy, there were lots of people visiting the castle. We also did a treasure hunt. It was a sunny day so we walked along the Royal Mile to get lunch and sat along the street and watched all the people pass by. It was a tiring day but I had fun." Katrina in S4 and Christopher in S3 told us about the trip to Glasgow, "We went to the Riverside Museum. It has the Tall Ship and some old cars, buses, steam trains, push bikes and trams. On Buchanan Street, we skipped along happily. We had a drink at Starbucks and we could here the Scottish bagpipes playing which linked to our research we had been doing in Music." On the Eyemouth and St. Abbs trip, Christopher and Louis M in S3 said, "We walked on the beach. There were seagulls and we all had ice cream as a treat. We were listening to the seagulls and the sea. We were there with Miss Flanagan and other S3 pupils who we got to know better and make friends with. Stable Life


S3 Work Experience

"I went to the Jed Eye newsletter for 4 days as my work experience. I was supervised and taken through the week by the editor, David Pike. My days included attending interviews and taking notes, shadowing David on his daily tasks, joining in on the bi-monthly news group meeting, viewing exhibitions, working on the newsletter layout on the computer and writing my own news story. The interviews were very interesting and I got to meet a lot of lovely characters in a short space of time. I learnt that the job of an editor (or even a part-time editor, as David is) takes a lot of work and enthusiasm. I also learnt that there are a lot of interesting stories and events for just the town of Jedburgh, and there is always plenty of stories available for the paper. This has been a great and insightful experience for me and has given me a chance to see a little of how the news world works. I will continue to pursue a career in Journalism as I feel more now that it is the job for me."

Teacher Influencer Insight Placements

During the month of May, some teachers in the Borders took part in 'Influencers Insight Placements'. Modern Languages teacher Mr Paus attended Mercat Tours in Edinburgh. English teacher Mrs Haywood went down to Carlisle to spend the day with ITV Border. Ms Higgin, in Maths went to the Scottish Public Pensions Agency in Tweedbank and Mrs Renwick, Geography went to Bowhill House and Grounds near Selkirk. Mrs Renwick kindly told us about her experience, "I spent some time finding out about the range of careers that are available within the wider Buccleuch group and was given a tour of the estate to see some of these in action. As well as jobs which relate to tourism at the house and visitor centre (in the café, shop, tour guides etc), there is also an education service run by the ranger and house manager, who offer various courses and activities for school groups and beyond. More widely, there are opportunities within property management and building services (including joiners, plumbers, electricians and other trades), farming, office work and admin-









istration as well as more specialist occupations relating to the paintings, furniture and artefacts owned by the Duke and his family. Employees at Buccleuch Estates have varying levels of qualification – from modern apprenticeships to specialist University degrees and also for pupils who leave school and go straight into the world of work. I was delighted to see that there is such a wide range of opportunities and also to hear that they are happy to have people on work experience if they are interested in working within these sectors. As a Geography teacher, many of these jobs had links to the subject so I was very pleased to see how some of the work done in school links into careers outwith the classroom."

Borders College Schools Academy Awards

The students were fully trained in fire-fighting techniques and had a spectacular passing out parade at the end of May. Monday 10th June — Team Earlston have landed! We started off by having our orientation where we learnt all about what we were going to be doing. We met Elly and Richard and also learnt some great tunes! We also had the opportunity visit a market in Moshi.

Tuesday 11th June—We visited the home of Velanora's mother as she is currently living with another family because their house was too small. We will be building them a new house. We began to dig the foundations, where we had to work as a team to pass rocks and buckets of sand. We made good progress! The site was very nice, with banana trees eve-



rywhere. The team also visited the worksite for Emmanuel and Happiness. We dug the foundations and moved many rocks while singing and dancing. We learned that 'pole pole' means go slowly, and 'haraka haraka' means go quicker, and 'nzito sana' means very heavy.

Wednesday 12th June—Wednesday was a jam-packed day! On our first full day at the worksite we visited Emmanuel and Happiness. Activities included working as a team to move heavy bricks and passing sand in buckets to complete the foundations. After a much needed shower we headed off to dinner with TAWREF representatives and Berwickshire High students who are also here in Tanzania. This was followed by some ceilidh dancing and we ended the night singing Auld Lang Syne and having a dance battle!

Thursday 13th June—Today our group visited Baracka and Christian. Two siblings who have lost both parents and don't have their own home. Today's main task was making the cement for the base of the house. This involved taking it in turns in walking down to the river to collect water for mixing with the sand manually, using shovels as there's no cement mixers here. This process was very eye-opening! Today's highlight was meeting all the children who came to watch us work at the site, playing football with them and showing them how to blow bubbles. Working at the site today was very fun and rewarding as we are now beginning to see progress. Tonight we went for a meal at Deli Chez which was very nice and we look forward to visiting the same site to see the progress and all the people again.

Friday 14th June— The progress made in the last couple of days has been incredible and we are extremely fortunate to be a part of this experience that will change the lives of other families. Over the past two days, we visited two orphanages, including Kimashuku Orphanage to visit the young people aged 3-17. We played two cracking games of football. They welcomed us with many tuneful and enjoyable songs. We left the orphanages feeling extremely grateful for what we have and also touched to see how funds can change the lives of many people around us.

Saturday 15th June—Today we had another half day on site which involved more moving soil and bricks. In the afternoon we visited Moshi's Children's Christian Centre where another game of football was played and there were many skilful people and goals!

Sunday 16th June—Very early 6.30am start. The African coffee was definitely needed! Today's breakfast consisted of some samosas and vegetable omelette. We then set off for church next to the local Christian medical school. The building was open and circular. The service lasted roughly 2 hours but was jam packed with a mixture of prayer, singing, dancing. We then left the church for the Marangu gate- the starting point for many Kilimanjaro climbers at 1896m in height. We then descended back into the foot hills to visit a museum about a local chaga tribe- which our own Elly Kimaro claims to belong to. Although he also claimed to have climbed Kilimanjaro on multiple occasions and whilst still in school! We then visited one of the last year's projects where we were warmly greeted by the church leader and house owner. We returned home to a Sunday roast- African style!- with chicken, roast potatoes, vegetable sauce, rice, watermelon, and African coleslaw. In the evening, our quiz night meant that the losing team had to make the winning team lunch!

Monday 17th June— Today, we started our day off earlier than last week with a 7:30 breakfast and left the college by 8:30 for a full day at the worksite. We split into two groups with one going to Emmanuel and the other to Velanora where the fundis (local builders) have made tremendous progress.

Tuesday 18th June—The day started with a typical breakfast before setting off for our last day on the worksite. One group headed to the Valenera site and the other to the Baraka site. The work at the site was minimal due to our hard graft earlier on as we had already surpassed expectations! After a light work session, the group headed back to Berea to clean up before heading to an orphanage for children aged 0-7. On arrival, we had a prolonged speech concerning the heritage of the orphanage. Shortly after, we were able to stretch our legs with the children in the park. As the sun was setting we travelled back to Berea where we had our tea then watched the Lion King to build up excitement for the much anticipated safari!

Hockey—Livvy Hogg (S4) represented the Scotland Under 16 Hockey squad at a tournament in Wales and also captained the team against England in Glasgow.

Athletics—Kiran Ramu (S2) and Tara Brennan (S3) competed in the South East of Scotland Air Cadets Sports. Kiran won 2 gold medals for 200m and 400m while Tara won bronze in the Shot Put. Kiran also represent the area at the regional sports event, winning gold in the 400m and bronze in the 200m. Kiran will go on to compete for the Scotland Under 15s at the UK Championship at Granthom.

Grace McWhinnie (S1), Finn Douglas (S3), Ewan Christie (S2), Cameron Rankine (S2) and Anna Fairclough (S2) took part in the East District and National Open Championships. Finn achieved 2 silver medals and 2 PBs in the U17 100m and 200m. Grace achieved a gold medal in the U13 Long Jump (beating her own PB 3 times!) and 5th and a PB in the 100m. Ewan was 2nd in his heat and qualified for the final, Cameron was 7th in same heat. Anna was 1 second off her PB. Personal Best times were achieved for Anna in the 1500m and Triple Jump, Cameron in the 1500m and Ewan in the 400m.

The Schools Track and Field Championships were held at Grangemouth on 8th June. We had a number of outstanding performances. These were the results of our EHS athletes Eloise Kerr: 800m (Heat 2 7th 2:38), Brogan Beattie: 100m (Heat 3 5th 14:00); 200m (Heat 2 5th 28:02), Logan Kerr: 200m (Heat 3 5th 28:95); 100m (Heat 3 6th 13.88); Long Jump (14th 4.03m), Cameron Rankine: 1500m (Heat 1 7th 4:50), Finn Douglas: 100m (Heat 2 1st 11:73; Semi-Final 2nd 11:83; Final 7th 11:72), Ewan Purves: 400m (Heat 2 3rd 53:86), Elspeth Panter: 100m (Heat 3 5th 14.43), Grace McWhinnie: 100m (Heat 2 5th 14.44); Long Jump (10th 4.02m)





Rugby—Finn Douglas (S3), Sam Derrick (S4) and Ben Lynch (S5) were selected to play for Scotland Under 16s at a rugby festival in Wales. Sam and Ben have been selected to attend a player development camp with 24 other players from around Scotland in Valladolid, Spain in the summer holidays.

Keiran Clark (S5) and Christian Townsend (S5) represented Scotland U17 vs England U17. Keiran also turned out for Melrose RFC at Earlston 7s and was named as player of the tournament.

Table Tennis—Hannah McDonnell (S1) represented Scotland at the British Schools Championship in Belfast, finishing joint 3rd. Hannah won the 'Mike Allison Junior Player of the Year Award' at the recent Edinburgh and Lothians Table Tennis League prize giving. Hannah will represent Scotland next at the British Senior Schools Event in Guernsey.

Judo—Blair McGowan (S1) won a well deserved silver medal for sparring. He was representing Team Borders at the UKTC 2019 Professor Chang Ung Cup International Open Taekwondo Championship which was held in Motherwell on June 2nd.

Tennis—Captain Alice MacBrayne (S6) and her team Annique Varty (S2), Felicity Walls (S3) and Ailsa Clark (S2) won their matches against Bourghmuir High School in the Scottish Schools Cup Quarter Finals. They went on to the Semi Finals at Craiglockhart where they were eventually beaten by a very strong George Watson's team. The girls have made history, taking EHS further in the competition than ever before. At the Borders Schools Tennis Championships in June, Earlston girls retained the trophy and Fraser Rout (S3) and Luke Townsend (S3) reached the final of the boys doubles.

Archery—Sophie Millar (S1) became the Eastern Area Archery Champion for under 14 year old girls on 31st March.

Swimming—Kirsty Gibb (S4) and the Borders Barracuda Para Swimming Squad achieved 3rd place overall at the National Senior Championships at Grangemouth.

Pupil Parliament

The Pupil Parliament has had a very successful year. The Parliament meets at least twice a term and feeds into the School Improvement Plan and helps to develop other areas of the school. This year the Parliament has been engaging with parts of the document How Good is our School, focussing on areas such Learning and Teaching and the School Environment

The refectory now has a new queuing system that has ensured a smoother lunchtime for many of our pupils. Water fountains have been fixed and replaced and ideas have been floated on how the school bulletin gets shared with pupils more regularly.

The Parliament has also discussed the need for more seating during breaktime and lunchtime. This has been taken to and discussed by the Senior Leadership Team and agreement is that obviously budget dictates how much progress can be made on this issue.

The Parliament, while discussing resources pointed out the need for improved digital technology so hopefully the roll out of the Inspire Learning programme will help in that respect. We are also due a refresh of new computers soon.

Before Christmas the Parliament designed a respect survey which a large proportion of the school completed. Feedback was given to the Senior Leadership Team. As a result of this, the S1 Leadership classes looked at the value of respect and how leadership can help with problems to do with respect in the school environment.

A group of the S3 Leadership team went to Ross High in Tranent to see how the pupils there helped improve Learning Logs. The parliament at EHS then dedicated a full meeting to looking at Learning logs and their findings were presented to the Senior Leadership Team. Learning log development was part of the 2018/19 School Improvement Plan. The Parliament created a Learning Log 'must have' list of points for the perfect Learning Log.

The Pupil Parliament will be recruiting new representatives for next year so get your applications in after the summer holidays to Mr Foggin.


New School Value
