




The evening's format, which was mainly aimed at S3 pupils in light of their looming subject choices, began with a brief introductory talk

Lessons from Auschwitz

Last month, myself and Gary Goodfellow (56) were lucky enough to represent Earlston High School and fly with Mrs Maciver to Poland. The trip was part of a yearly scheme set up by Lessons from Auschwitz which sends two students from schools around the country. While there, we visited the town of Oświęcim and both the Auschwitz I and the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camps.

Before our visit, we had the privilege of attending an orientation seminar at the Sheraton Hotel in Edinburgh and listening to an Auschwitz survivor speak. She told us her mother's story, and about how she herself was born in the camp shortly before it was liberated by allied forces.



All in a day trip; we flew out to Kraków in the early hours of the morning, spent the day touring Oświęcim and the two camps, before flying home late in the evening.

Both Auschwitz camps felt very surreal. However, the true magnitude of where we were didn't sink in until after the sun had set and everyone on the trip stood

together, holding candles and listening to the Rabbi sing. Although I found visiting the camps to be a harrowing experience, I believe it was a very important once in a lifetime experience.

After our return home, we attended another seminar in Edinburgh during which we discussed how we would use our experience and our new knowledge through the Next Steps program. Over the next few months we will both submit 500 word statements about the trip alongside speaking to younger classes throughout the school to educate them on the magnitude and nature of the Holocaust.

This was a very valuable visit for all and particularly for those pupils thinking about a future career in farming and agriculture, health care, veterinary medicine or food and hospitality. 51 Media Careers morning


The latest careers morning for S1s was held on Tuesday 7th November and was a great way to find out a whole range of jobs that come under the heading of Media.
